



Over the last 75 years, Florida Gateway College has expanded not just in program offerings, but in physical space. Today, the college is comprised of two campuses, the main campus and the Public Safety Training Center, and an outreach center in Dixie County.



Main Campus

The heart and soul of Florida Gateway College begins on the main campus, which, in addition to being home base for a multitude of college and occupational certificate options, associate of art, associate of science and bachelor's degree programs, is the hub of student life and involvement.



Opened in spring 2011, the Wilson S. Rivers Library & Media Center contains well-over 30,000 books and 70 computers ideal for research and study sessions. The mouthwatering Gateway Grille fuels students and faculty throughout the day while the Levy Performing Arts Center provides entertainment with theatre productions and limited-run student art shows on select evenings and weekends. Students aiming to show their school spirit can cheer on the Timberwolves at the Howard Center or attend one of over a dozen on-campus events and activities held throughout the semester. Students can live on campus in residence halls and exercise in the fitness center, while 24/7 security is provided by the Sheriff's department.

As far as academic resources are concerned, the main campus also harbors the advising offices, Student Success Center and the Career Service Center. Innovative instruction tools include Nursing's high fidelity simulation lab, virtual reality welding trainers, cadaver lab and SynDaver Technology for Anatomy and Physiology instruction, and LightBoard technology.

Public Safety Training Center

FGC's Public Safety Training Center, also referred to as the Olustee campus, is a 50-acre complex that offers four core occupational programs with the Law Enforcement Academy, Corrections, Emergency Medical Services and the Fire Academy.

Under the Law Enforcement Academy, students can earn an Occupational Certificate in CMS Law Enforcement–Basic Recruit or an Associate in Science for Criminal Justice Technology whereas Corrections provides an Occupational Certificate in Correctional–Basic Recruit. Through Emergency Medical Services, prospective students can obtain an Associate in Science for Emergency Medical Services Technology or a College Credit Certificate as an Emergency Medical Technician or as a Paramedic while the Fire Academy trains students for an Occupational Certificate in Firefighter Minimum Standards or an Occupational Certificate that combines both EMT and Firefighting.

In addition to providing multiple certificate and degree options, students at the Olustee campus are given real-life, hands-on experiences with advanced technological equipment like the MILO training system for virtual, interactive training scenarios and the Anatomage Table, which allows students to perform simulated operations on digital bodies.



Dixie Center

Students enrolled at FGC don't have to travel all the way to Lake City to take advantage of student-based amenities. The Dixie Center, which is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., provides everything from information on FGC programs and enrollment processes to test proctoring, computer lab use and printing capabilities as well as several study areas. More recently, the campus also implemented Adult Basic Education (ABE) and GED preparation programs for adults age 16 and older.



The Heart of the Campus

FGC's New STEM Building



From humble beginnings as a forestry school with a mere handful of students, Florida Gateway College has grown exponentially over the last 75 years in multiple facets and has evolved through several name changes.

Its overall district reach has grown to serve five North Central Florida counties: Baker, Columbia, Dixie, Gilchrist and Union. Its physical size now encompasses two campuses, the main campus in Lake City and Public Safety Training Center in Olustee, and an outreach center in Dixie County. Their enrollment

numbers hover around 5,000 students annually, and academic options today include two-year and four-year degrees, as well as certificate programs and applied technology diplomas that range from one semester to one year.

While expansion is important, FGC also strives to improve upon the elements already present on campus—especially concerning its older, more historic structures—to ensure the best learning environment for both current and future students. When considering the facilities where students and faculty were engaging in science,

technology, engineering and math education, FGC recognized the need for modernization.

After undertaking its biggest construction project since the 2011 opening of the Wilson S. Rivers Library and Media Center, FGC unveiled the Quinn & Keith Leibfried STEM Building in June, which coincided with the kickoff of the anniversary of the college's founding 75 years ago.

be educated in a state-of-the-art facility for that," said Lee Pinchouck, who is the Executive Director of Resource Development at FGC.

Though it didn't break ground until March 2021, the venture has been in the works since 2015 when Dr. Lawrence Barrett became the Florida Gateway College President.

"From a STEM perspective, something that's outdated when you're looking at science and technology in this environment and this day and age, things change rapidly, so to have a science building that was over 50 years old and antiquated and basically not environmentally friendly, it was very important to take that as the first step," Dr. Barrett said.

"When the building was designed by the architects, we called it the heart building," he continued. "That was considered the heart because that's the center of the campus, so we called it the heart project when we went into it."

The previous building, which was 21,000 square feet, was knocked down in 2018, leaving STEM-based

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students and faculty without a proper space for the past four years while awaiting approval of state budget funds, grants made through the Foundation for Florida Gateway College and other generous community donations like those made by the First Federal

Bank, which contributed to the project to name the facility after their chairman, Keith Leibfried, and his late wife, Quinn.

"In addition to First Federal naming the building, all the labs,

large classrooms, and student collaboration spaces have all been sponsored and named by community members. Whether it is for their company or in memory of a loved one, our community has really stepped up to help provide additional funding," Pinchouck said.

The new two-story, 26,440 square-foot structure will feature an all-new chemistry lab, microbiology lab, physics and earth science lab, and biology and botany lab, all of which will contain new equipment as well as movable lab workspaces. The facility, which overlooks the quad and offers an

abundance of natural light with the addition of large window panes, will also house four math classrooms, 12 faculty offices and the office of the Vice President of Academic Affairs in addition to several multipurpose and collaboration spaces for students.

The large staircase that leads to the second floor will also invite visitors to a 14-by-20-foot wall that, while initially was set to be a stagnant mural, will be the future site of a hologram wall that can be changed and updated as needed.

FGC's 75th year is being honored and commemorated with a series of events, which began with the grand opening of the Quinn & Keith Leibfried STEM building in June. "We're trying to modernize but also remember our roots," Dr. Barrett said. "We're trying to honor the past with the future for the next 75 years."







Go, Wolves, Go! **FGC Athletics**

For the last seven decades. athletics have weaved in and out of the Florida Gateway College experience while routinely shifting in semester-by-semester availability from tried-and-true staples like cross country, softball, basketball and volleyball; to intramural offerings like ping pong, tennis and archery; as well as more limited-edition options like cheerleading, gymnastics and golf before coming to a lengthy standstill.

After a 10-year hiatus, athletics returned to the FGC campus in 2018 with men's golf and women's volleyball, both of which would pave the way for a legacy beyond the accomplishments made under the Lake City Community College name.

"We haven't switched sports for any other reason than to support our local community, to create that sustainability to help them build

> that pillar and that foot in the ground to build those programs because that's always a key concern of ours," added Rebecca Golden, who is the former Director of **Athletics** and current Director of

Resource Development with the Foundation of Florida Gateway College. "We looked at our community and we're trying to meet the needs of the studentathletes in our area in our fivedistrict county."





Today, the FGC athletics department oversees five programs: men's basketball, women's cross country, esports and its two latest additions of women's flag football and women's softball, with flag football being one of the fastest-growing women's sports in the state and FGC having organized the first National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) esports program in Florida.

"We can have volleyball, softball, golf, cross country and then you just look like every other college out there and you really, in such a competitive environment for higher education, especially today, you have to have niche sports; you have to be a little bit different and you see that with esports; you're going to see that with women's flag football; you're going to see that with some of our clubs. I mean, we have a bass fishing team who does very, very well and even though they're not in athletics, it's one of those niche sports that makes us different," Cardenas said.

While incorporating up-and-coming athletic programs is always of interest, FGC intertwines the latest trends while paying homage to the college's recreational roots.

"You've got a mix of the past and the future in our athletic program—you really do—especially with softball coming back, but now you've got esports and flag football, which didn't even exist when athletics was first started here," Cardenas said. "I think it represents the school the best; I mean, it's a department that truly represents where we were and where we're going."

Cardenas and Golden are also observant of giving sufficient attention to each program under the department and building on its success and that of the student's

FGC Sports History Spotlight

Jean Williams

Jean Williams came to Florida
Gateway College in 1966 as a guidance
counselor and simultaneously served
as director of financial aid before
becoming a physical education coach
in 1971.

During this time, after the passing of Title IX, women's competitive sports started officially organizing in community colleges—including at FGC. Williams helped develop the Women's Intercollegiate Athletic Program at the college by bringing both

women's volleyball and women's softball to campus—coaching the volleyball program from 1971 to 1983 when the sport was swapped for women's basketball and remained the softball coach from its inception in 1971 until she retired in 1994. Throughout her tenure at FGC, which at the time was under the Lake City Community College name, Williams held several roles including the Athletic Director and Director of Counseling Services. Outside FGC, Williams maintained a position as the Women's Athletic Commissioner for the Florida Community College Activities Association for 15 years; the Region 8 Director for Women for the NJC for 12 years; and served as the NCJAA representative for the U.S. Olympic Committee for the World University Games in Alberta, Canada, in 1983 and Poland in 1993.

"If I, as a person, ever had a dream or something that I wanted my legacy to be, was that we would begin programs for girls' sports, and essentially that's what happened," she said.

Under her reign as head coach for the women's softball team at FGC,

the Timberwolves won seven NJCAA Slow-Pitch National Titles in 1983, 1986, 1987, 1989, 1990, 1992 and 1993. After her retirement, the successful legacy continued with the team earning the NJCAA Division I Fast-Pitch National Championship Title in 2001 before the athletic department dissolved in 2008. Through her work with the volleyball team, Williams was named the Conference Coach-of-the-Year for eight consecutive seasons and coached the team

into participating in 13 State


Championships and three NCJAA National Championships. The history she helped pave the way for gained resurgence with the reformation of the athletic programs at FGC in 2018 with the temporary return of women's volleyball and the long-awaited return of women's softball in the fall.

FGC Sports History Spotlight

Tom Clark

After coaching for a high school team in Michigan and later Georgia, and spending six years as the head coach for a Georgia junior college, Tom Clark took a position at FGC in 1994 where he paved a legacy as a professor, baseball coach and athletic director.

During his 14-year career as a baseball coach for the Timberwolves, Clark helped the team win a total of 463 games and two Mid-Florida Conference Championships, the latter of which

earned him the title of Mid-Florida Conference Coach of the Year on both occasions. In 1999, under his leadership, the team was ranked the number-one junior college baseball team in the nation and set a

state record with a 27-1 conference record.





The team also led the nation in number of drafted players in both 2002 with six players and in 2005 with nine players. Before the athletic department officially disappeared in 2008, Clark's final baseball team consisted of Roberto Pérez, who currently plays in the major leagues for the Pittsburgh Pirates. Clark seemingly had a knack for coaching future professional major league players as he was also head coach for Deunte Heath, who was a professional pitcher for the Chicago White

Sox; Heath Phillips, former left-handed pitcher for the Chicago White Sox; Carlos Corporan, who was a catcher for Milwaukee, Houston and Texas; Brian Schlitter, who was a right-handed pitcher for the Cubs and Oakland Athletics; and Reggie Abercrombie, who was a former outfielder for the Florida Marlins and Houston Astros.

After the athletic department faded from the college in 2008, Clark stayed on as a professor for one more year before becoming a scout for the Chicago Cubs where he has remained ever since. During his time in the major leagues, Clark was named scout of the year for the Chicago Cubs and scout of the year for the Florida Diamond Club.

Though baseball isn't on the current roster of available sports at FGC, its presence on campus during Tom Clark's residency is just one part of the school's accomplished athletic history, which will only grow with its 2018 revival.

Continued from page 11. athletic and academic progress rather than trying to offer too many options at once.

"Short-term, we want to see the current athletic department and athletic programs to get a really solid footing and get their programs established to be known—to be. yes, if you want a quality softball program, you go to Florida Gateway College; if you want esports, one of the first schools that people think of is Florida Gateway College. We want to be the first to come to mind; we want to be the first in line when you start thinking about some of the sports that we have here. I see that happening in cross country; I see that happening in basketball," Cardenas said. "That's short term, that's what we want is to build that reputation, build that reputation of the program."

Beyond the two new athletic programs and a recent renovation to the Howard Center gymnasium, the department is also working on organizing a Hall of Fame for the school to honor those who made significant athletic achievements at the college and beyond with the first batch of inductees set to be honored in 2023.

"I know we didn't have athletics for 75 years, but we're looking at the entire scope of the athletic program from the very first pitch to the very first basketball or the very first tournament to take off all the way to today, and when that first flag football touchdown is scored, every one of those athletes is eligible to become a part of the Hall of Fame and become a permanent part of the history of Florida Gateway College," Cardenas said.


The Timberwolves won the Division II cross country championship on the 2.9-mile course at Central Florida Junior College and finished fifth in the state.

Clubs encourage student involvement, and the 1979 class could choose from an array of interests including the art club, the newlyformed drama club, debate team, student government association and more.




